Dear Members,

As Chief Executive and Chair, we would like to thank you for your continued commitment to hockey in Wales and to reflect on what has been one of the toughest years in our organisation’s recent history.

This year brought significant financial challenge, with the lowest level of Sport Wales funding we have received in many years. Despite this, the resilience shown by our clubs, volunteers, officials, coaches, players, and staff has been exceptional. Time and again, the hockey community has demonstrated its ability to adapt, support one another, and keep our sport thriving.

Our latest Annual Report highlights just how strong hockey in Wales remains. At its heart is community, inclusion, welcoming, and proudly diverse. Participation in schools’ competitions has increased by 37%, junior membership is up year on year, and we have seen encouraging growth in people stepping into roles beyond playing. New coaching and umpiring licences issued this year reflect the breadth of individuals giving their time and expertise to support the game at all levels.

On the field, Welsh hockey continues to punch above its weight. Together, we will continue to grow a sport that is inclusive, ambitious, and deeply connected to its communities.

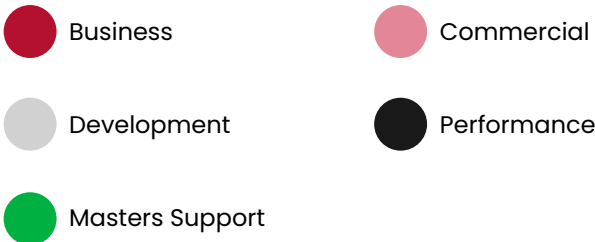

Facilities & Funding

Sport Wales Collaboration Group

Hockey's place in the Welsh sporting landscape has been shaped, in no small part, by a decade of collaborative investment. The Sport Wales Collaboration Group, a three-sport partnership between Hoci Cymru, the Football Association of Wales (FAW), and the Welsh Rugby Union (WRU), has grown from a strategic vision into one of the most impactful facility programmes operating across Wales today.

What began in 2015 as a framework to influence future investment decisions has since delivered over £10 million of grant funding, supporting more than seventy projects from Ynys Môn to Monmouthshire. For hockey specifically, the Collaboration Group has channelled over £4.99 million into artificial pitch development since its inception, a figure that represents not just surfaces and floodlights, but communities able to access the game year-round.

How the Programme Works

The funding process is deliberately rigorous. Projects are typically developed over a minimum of twelve months before formal submission, with Hoci Cymru staff working alongside local authorities, schools, and leisure trusts to build credible, well-structured applications. Each bid is then reviewed by a multi-sport working group against criteria covering facility landscape, sporting significance, governance, and return on investment. Final approval sits with the CEOs of all three Governing Bodies and Sport Wales, ensuring the highest level of accountability.

Annually, Sport Wales allocates £1 million toward artificial pitch development across Wales. Hockey competes for a share of this alongside football and rugby, making early and effective collaboration with local authorities and the FAW essential to unlocking investment.

2025/26 Panel Outcomes

This year, hockey submitted four applications to the Collaboration Group with a combined requested value of £1,381,000. Of the £1,320,000 capital funding pot available, £530,000 has been confirmed for hockey. Across all three sports, football secured three successful applications totalling £540,000, while rugby received one award of £250,000 from three applications totalling £750,000.

Active Projects & Stakeholder Engagement

Hoci Cymru is actively engaged with a pipeline of projects across Wales.

Key results include:

- Pitch completed and officially opened at Dysynni.
- Development at Northop Hall to start later this year with monies from the £530,000 collaboration capital funding pot confirmed for hockey



Be Active Wales Fund: Hockey Awards 2025–26

Alongside capital investment in facilities, Welsh hockey clubs have been active participants in Sport Wales' Be Active Wales Fund (BAWF), a grassroots grant programme designed to support clubs and community groups in improving participation and widening access to sport. Across three funding windows running from April 2025 to March 2026, a total of ten hockey applications were successful, delivering £32,022 in direct funding to clubs across Wales.

From junior sections in rural mid-Wales to clubs spanning the north and south, the breadth of organisations supported reflects the diversity within the hockey community. Nine of Wales's twenty-two local authority areas are represented across the successful awards, a geographic spread that speaks to the reach of hockey across the country.

WINDOW 1 — SUMMER 2025 (July Panel)

Three hockey clubs applied in Window 1, with all three receiving funding decisions in their favour by the July 2025 panel. Combined committed funding reached £5,795:

Risca Ladies Hockey Club (Caerphilly)

£1,928 awarded toward Junior Section Redevelopment, supporting the next generation of female players in the region.

Clwb Hoci Pwllheli (Gwynedd)

£1,259 committed to a project focused on "Keeping seniors on the pitch and juniors in the game", addressing both retention and recruitment in one initiative.

Presteigne Junior Hockey Club (Powys)

£2,608 committed to "Promoting a healthy hockey lifestyle!", a club working to embed hockey into the sporting culture of a rural Welsh community.

WINDOW 2 — AUTUMN 2025 (November Panel)

Window 2 saw four hockey clubs receive awards, with committed funding of £17,754. The cohort demonstrated the breadth of the game geographically, from Pembrokeshire in the west to Denbighshire in the north:

Milford Haven Hockey Club (Pembrokeshire)

£1,215 committed from a £5,065 total project cost.

Clwb Hoci Llandysul (Ceredigion)

£3,245 committed from a £3,605 project, a strong funding rate of 90% of the amount applied for.

Gowerton Hockey Club (Swansea)

£6,832 committed from a £7,592 project, the largest single award in this window for hockey.

Ruthin Hockey Club (Denbighshire)

£6,462 committed from a £9,780 project.

WINDOW 3 — WINTER/SPRING 2026 (February Panel)

Window 3 delivered the largest single-window total for hockey, with three awards committing £11,081 across a varied group of organisations:

Wrexham Glyndwr Hockey Club (Wrexham)

£5,400 committed from a £5,890 project, 100% of the amount applied for, reflecting a well-prepared application.

Clwb Hoci Castell Newydd Emlyn (Pembrokeshire)

£3,731 committed from a £4,996 project. This club was unsuccessful in Window 2 and returned with a revised application, a testament to persistence and the value of re-engaging with the process.

Clwb Hoci Tywi Teigrod (Carmarthenshire)

£1,950 committed. This club was also rejected in Window 2 and successfully reapplied, a notable example of a club working with the process rather than stepping away from it.

Year in Numbers

Two clubs, Clwb Hoci Castell Newydd Emlyn and Clwb Hoci Tywi Teigrod, were rejected in Window 2 and successfully reapplied in Window 3

Combined with the £530,000 confirmed through the Sport Wales Collaboration Group in 2025/26, and the broader pipeline of capital projects in development with local authorities across Wales, this has been a year of significant funding activity for Welsh hockey. The work continues.

Safeguarding

Overview

Safeguarding remains a central priority for Hoci Cymru. In 2025/26 we have continued to strengthen our processes, increase support for Club Welfare Officers (CWOs), and build a culture where reporting is seen as a sign of strength.

This year saw a 20% increase in safeguarding reports received. As in previous years, we view this positively, it reflects improved awareness, greater confidence in reporting pathways, and stronger relationships with clubs across Wales.

Club Welfare Officer Programme

Unlike previous seasons, 2025/26 saw structured CWO check-ins run throughout the year rather than at isolated points. These regular touchpoints allowed us to identify gaps early, offer timely support, create space for questions and feedback, and track CWO confidence levels across the season.

CLUBS SHARING BEST PRACTICE

A significant development this season has been clubs actively sharing what works well within their own environments. This peer-led approach has included:

- How clubs structure safeguarding inductions for new members and volunteers
- Communication approaches clubs use to remind members of reporting processes
- How clubs handle welfare conversations sensitively with parents and young players
- Practical approaches to running safeguarding-aware team environments

The Safeguarding Network on Spond continues to serve as the hub for CWO communication, with new resources and updated guidance circulated regularly.

Reporting in 2025/26

This season Hoci Cymru received 94 safeguarding reports, a 20% increase on 2024/25 and 52% up on 2023/24. Reports are received via our online incident report form and MyConcern, our case management platform.

This increase reflects:

- Greater awareness of what constitutes a safeguarding concern
- Higher confidence in our reporting processes
- A culture shift within clubs where speaking up is normalised
- The impact of Safe Socials, CWO communications, and myth-busting content

Our goal is not to reduce the number of reports, it is to ensure every concern is heard, handled well, and used to improve our sport.

What We Have Done This Season

- Safe Socials Week, myth-busting content to encourage confident reporting
- Year-round CWO check-ins, not just at the start or end of season
- Clubs presenting best practice to other clubs
- Updated guidance documents circulated via the Safeguarding Network
- Performance team safeguarding protocols reviewed and refreshed
- CPSU Level 3 Standard maintained for the second successive year

Heritage project

The Welsh Hockey Cap Project

Now seven to eight years in the making, the Welsh Hockey Cap Project remains one of the most ambitious and meaningful pieces of historical work ever undertaken by Hoci Cymru. The aim is simple but extraordinary: to produce a complete match and player cap record for every capped Welsh international, men and women, from 1895 to the present day.

That goal is closer than ever. Thanks to the remarkable dedication of Phil Bailey and Steve Knight, what started from nothing has grown into a rich, detailed, and still-growing archive that will serve Welsh hockey for generations to come. The large majority of the research is now complete or near completion, and the final pieces of the jigsaw, while the hardest to find, are firmly in our sights.

Phil Bailey and Steve Knight

None of this would exist without Phil and Steve. Voluntarily and tirelessly, they have driven this project forward, visiting archives, contacting former internationals, cross-referencing historical records across multiple sources, and piecing together a picture of Welsh hockey history that had never previously been captured in one place.

Their work this year has continued at pace. Key highlights from April 2025 to April 2026 include:

- Using photographs taken at The Hockey Museum (THM) in 2024 of Patrick Rowley’s match records to fill in gaps in historical match data, a significant step forward in completing our records for specific decades
- Meeting with England’s Katie Dodd at Lee Valley, which opened a hugely exciting opportunity: a potential joint visit to FIH Headquarters in Lausanne with researchers from England (Katie Dodd) and Scotland (Alan Veitch), where match sheets held in the FIH archive could unlock missing records for all three nations
- Receiving further information and contacts from Chris Brewer and Martyn Gallivan following the most recent Caps Presentation, adding new leads to chase for player records
- Continuing correspondence with Nan Thomas to arrange a meeting and review her personal records

- Following up with Zak Jones, who played through one of the most complex periods in the cap record (post-2002) and who has already provided valuable context around how caps were awarded in that era
- Coordinating with Rae Ellis, who has been going through the records and belongings of a former Welsh international and has set aside boxes of historical material, including photographs, programmes, and personal memorabilia, for Phil and Steve to collect
- Presenting Lorraine Sharp with her international cap, one of the most personal and meaningful parts of the project
- Planning a presentation for Helen Jones, who will receive her cap when she travels over from the United States

Sources and Research

The project draws on a remarkable breadth of sources that Phil and Steve have spent years identifying, accessing, and cross-referencing. These include:

- British Newspaper Archive and Welsh Newspapers Online
- The Times and The Telegraph historical records
- A men's Welsh Hockey Union match and player database covering 1899 to 2002
- Welsh Hockey Selection Books
- Coach and player records held by Hoci Cymru
- FIH database records from 2014 to present
- FIH match sheets
- Memorabilia held at Hoci Cymru, photographs, programmes, and historical documents
- Photographs of Patrick Rowley's personal match records, taken during a 2024 visit to The Hockey Museum

Patrick Rowley was a prominent newspaper journalist in the post-war period whose personal match records are among the most detailed sources for that era. His records have already allowed Phil and Steve to compile more complete match data for a number of periods, though individual player and scorer details remain outstanding pending receipt of the full digital records from THM.

Outstanding Work and Next Steps

FIH HEADQUARTERS VISIT — LAUSANNE

In January Steve joined representatives from England and Scotland in a visit to the FIH HQ in Lausanne. The group had access to 80 tournament files from the FIH archive, 56 files held relevant information, enabling Steve to fill many of the gaps in Welsh records.

The trip was a huge success and the co-operation and bonds formed between all parties will ease our ad-hoc requests for future information.

Our thanks to Katie Dodd for her involvement and her influence in pushing for this visit.

PATRICK ROWLEY'S DIGITAL RECORDS — THM

Despite multiple requests, The Hockey Museum has not yet provided a digital copy of Patrick Rowley's Welsh records. This remains an outstanding action, and further correspondence has been sent. Receiving these records would allow Phil and Steve to cross-reference and further complete the match-level detail already gathered.

MEN'S FIRST SELECTION BOOK

The first Welsh men's Selection Book, covering the period prior to and between the World Wars, was loaned to The Hockey Museum by Chris Brewer. Securing access to this book, even temporarily, would allow Phil and Steve to cross-reference current research and fill in remaining gaps for one of the most historically significant periods in Welsh hockey.

GEOFF MEDLOW'S WOMEN'S RECORDS

Steve is still awaiting Geoff Medlow's records for the women's programme. These are expected to help fill a number of gaps in the women's historical record, particularly in the post-war decades.

DIGITISATION OF THE ARCHIVE

Digitising the full record remains a priority. Some of the most important historical documentation is not yet in digital form, and capacity to complete this work is limited. This is something Hoci Cymru will need to continue to find a solution to ensure the archive is properly preserved and accessible.

Caps Celebration Event

Our annual Caps Celebration, one of the most special events in the Hoci Cymru calendar, will not be held in the spring this year. With an exceptionally busy period of development and performance team activity taking priority, we have taken the decision to move this year's event to August or September 2026.

This means more caps to award, more stories to tell, and what promises to be an even more special occasion when we do bring our alumni together. We very much look forward to celebrating with everyone who deserves recognition, and to continuing our tradition of connecting Wales's current generation of players with the proud international history they are part of.

Fishguard primary school festival = over 150 pupils

Fishguard and Goodwick HC recently provided funding to get pupils from Croesgoch Primary School to Fishguard Primary Festival and take part in hockey activities.

One of the club's young players approached the school's headteacher about the opportunity to attend the hockey day, but unfortunately the school could not afford the travel. Croesgoch, a small school with limited funding, is already stretched with its travel commitments to activities such as swimming and other educational events.

As the information found its way to the club, the committee took a vote and decided to support the school with funding to pay for a bus. One of the club's committee members visited the school and explained how he would've loved the same opportunity when he was a pupil at Croesgoch.

The decision allowed 23 pupils to travel to Fishguard Primary Festival, enjoying a fantastic day taking part in a range of fun-filled hockey activities. As a result, Fishguard and Goodwick have welcomed three of the school's pupils into the club! Golden tickets were also handed out to the pupils that attended the festival, offering two free training sessions as an introduction to the sport and the club.

This initiative has also proved incredibly successful, with the club receiving multiple enquiries about joining up.

Bridgend Ladies – engagement day

The club hosted an event to engage with pupils around Bridgend and surrounding areas, sharing the fun and benefits of hockey by offering a range of activities.

Also, offering goodie bags, free t-shirt and sweets. The club ensured the children attending the event knew how to join Hoci Cymru affiliated clubs. Supported by HYA and parents.



Carmarthen Hockey club – fundraising:

The club's commitment to making hockey more accessible to all and passion for sustainability is a great example of the impact our clubs can make in their local communities.

The clubs' "Access to Hockey Fund" has supported over 15 families over the last 2 seasons and enabled them to take part in the sport they love and remain part of the CAHC community.

This year, the club's annual bingo night has also gone towards the fundraising efforts for our U21 Women's team who went to Chile for the Junior World Cup, led by former CAHC junior Betsan Thomas.

In addition, their kit bucket initiative has represented a large part of their commitment to the environment while providing more than 30 players with an affordable way to try the sport before committing to buying new gear.

Castell Alun Primary cluster hockey festival back on the calendar

The Castell Alun Hockey Festival which was supported by Lucie from Buckley Hockey Club and Will from Gwella provided a valuable opportunity for over 80 pupils from five local primary schools to experience and develop their hockey skills. Prior to the festival, each school received at least one taster session, delivered by a coach from Buckley Hockey Club where they learned the basics on the playground at their primary school.

The programme concluded with all participating schools attending a festival hosted by Ysgol Castell Alun on the school astroturf. 16 pupils from Castell Alun who had completed the Hockey Leaders award earlier in the year were able to run the event, umpiring the games and ensuring it all ran smoothly. Some of the hockey leaders have now started to help at the school extra curricular club, while others are assisting in their local clubs.

The event was very well received, with pupils demonstrating some excellent hockey skills as well as enthusiasm, teamwork and enjoyment throughout.

Disability Sport Wales insport Series event in Bangor provided inclusive hockey for disabled adults and young people across North Wales

Hoci Cymru attended the Disability Sport Wales insport series event in Bangor along with support from Emily from Wrexham Glyndwr Hockey Club. Around 300 children from schools across Gwynedd were able to experience hockey for the first time. The event provided an inclusive and welcoming environment where pupils could learn basic hockey skills, develop their fundamental motor skills, build confidence and take part in physical activity alongside their peers.

Children took part in practical hockey activities designed to introduce the fundamentals of the game. Sessions focused on simple, engaging skills such as holding the stick safely, moving with the ball, passing, controlling the ball and for some they were working together in small groups. The activities were structured to be inclusive, allowing pupils of different abilities and confidence levels to participate successfully.

Pupils enjoyed the sessions, with many showing growing confidence as they became familiar with the equipment. The practical, hands-on nature of the activities helped children engage quickly

Inclusive Practice

A key strength of the event was its inclusive approach. Activities were adapted so that children could participate at a level that suited them, with an emphasis on enjoyment, encouragement and personal achievement rather than competition. This helped create a positive environment where pupils could try something new without pressure.

HWYL HOCI Camps

• Total camps held: 21

We have successfully delivered 21 hockey camps across Wales. These camps have provided opportunities for children and young people to access quality hockey experiences in both school holidays and off-season periods. There have been engagement camps for those starting out on their hockey journey, and Skills+ camps for those more established players looking to develop their existing skills and experience camps at a pace similar to the RPC level and beyond.

• Total participants: 382

A total of 382 children and young people have engaged with our camps, demonstrating a strong interest and growing demand for hockey opportunities at the grassroots level.

• Average participants per Camp: 20

On average, each camp has welcomed just over 20 participants which is an increase from last year. This uptake reflects both the accessibility of the sessions and our efforts to ensure manageable group sizes and low coach: participant ratios to ensure quality coaching and safety.

• Future Camps

We have more camps with some new venues scheduled in the coming holidays. These will help us to further build on existing momentum and continue reaching new participants, particularly in areas identified as having less access to opportunities.

• Completed Camps

The completed camps have shown where there is a need and an interest within community settings. There have been Engagement camps for 7 – 12-year-olds, and Skills+ camps for 13 – 18-year-olds across the regions. An introduction of a GK coach at certain camps when available has been a new addition and has been very well received, growing our provision of hockey at all levels.

Locations in Wales: Pwllheli, Colwyn Bay, Denbigh, Wrexham, Brecon, Cwmtawe, Fishguard, Cardiff.

• Delivered in different locations across Wales

Camps have been strategically located across 8 different areas in Wales this year, with a strong focus on decreasing the travel time required for children to access a hockey camp in Wales. This includes targeted work in areas where cost, geography, or facility access have previously been barriers to participation. By taking a community-first approach, we've aimed to ensure that more children have the chance to pick up a stick and get involved in the sport, regardless of background or postcode.

• HYA involvement

We have had our Hockey Young Ambassadors volunteering at the Hwyl hockey camps this year. 30 HYAs have been involved across the country, developing their coaching skills.



Hwyl Hoci Camps are designed for players aged 8-13 of all skill levels, whether they're picking up a hockey stick for the first time or looking to sharpen their game.

Residential Camp — May 2025

In Partnership with Christ College Brecon

May 2025 marked a landmark moment for our organisation as we delivered our first ever residential hockey camp, held in partnership with Christ College Brecon. The camp brought together 35 young players from across Wales, 22 girls and 13 boys aged between 13 and 17, for an immersive, multi-day hockey experience.

Participants benefited from high-quality coaching delivered by staff from both Hoci Cymru and Christ College Brecon, offering a blend of technical development, tactical understanding, and team building in a residential setting.

A highlight of the camp was the involvement of Wales women’s international Amy Cradden and men’s player Owen Sutton, whose appearances provided inspiration and invaluable insight for the young players, many of whom are aspiring to represent Wales at junior and senior level.

The camp received outstanding feedback from participants and parents alike. One attendee summed up the experience:



“I absolutely loved the residential camp — there were loads of new drills that helped improve my skills, as well as meeting new players from across Wales. I will definitely book again.”

This inaugural camp has firmly established the residential programme as a cornerstone of our player development pathway, and we look forward to building on its success in the years ahead.

County Pathway

The County Pathway programme took place throughout Wales, covering 11 different locations (including County Championships in Swansea). Though inclement weather threatened to impact the programme, the large majority of feedback has once again been positive and reflects the hard work that has gone on behind the scenes to keep it running smoothly.

County Championships ran through the February half-term and was supported well by a number of our Young Ambassadors. Through their diligent work, over £450 was raised selling merchandise and accessories. They also contributed massively in helping run pitchside operations and the engagement stands (darts and speed gun).

This event was also well attended by parents and demonstrates the quality of the offering that is in place at the end of long training programme. Each county had 8 training sessions and scheduled matches, providing over 12 hours of contact time per county for coaches and players, this is in addition to school/club offerings that players already have in place.

There were roughly 900 nominations across all counties and this led to 500 participants (approximately 62 per county), an excellent sign for the development of players going forwards in the Welsh Pathway. This further translated into 180 players nominated for the Regional Development Programme. This signals a 55% retention of nomination to participation and a 36% through rate from County to Regional.

All aspects of the County Pathway were discussed on an end-of-season forum. The major talking points of which were:

- 1 Player Sign-Up & Nomination Process
- 2 Workforce Development & Coach Engagement
- 3 Facilities Planning
- 4 Administration, Communications & Kit
- 5 County Championships Review & Talent ID

1. Player Sign-Up & Nomination Process

The move away from self-nomination towards coach and teacher nominations has been a positive step this year. However, there are still data protection concerns around the information collected at sign-up, and a proposal to allow parents to complete sensitive information directly should be explored. Expanding the ANT region to absorb some Dyfed players is also under consideration to manage participation numbers.

2. Workforce Development & Coach Engagement

Expanding the coaching workforce is a priority, as minimum standards are occasionally being compromised due to availability constraints. Coach attendance at meetings needs to be formalised and made compulsory, with meeting schedules shifted to better suit existing coaching commitments. All coaches must meet the required Minimum Operating Standards (MOS) before the start of next season.

3. Facilities Planning

Facility decisions for the coming season are largely in place, including Cwmbran for Gwent based on parental feedback. Planning for North Wales requires flexibility, with four potential venues being assessed based on player sign-up geography. The suitability of Mold's floodlighting for evening sessions remains an open issue.

4. Administration, Communications & Kit

A consistent and clearly communicated comms structure, centred on Spond, needs to be established from the outset. FAQs and pathway information should be redirected to the website to reduce ad hoc queries. Kit ordering should be consolidated at the start of the season, with a print-on-demand service considered to address sizing and stock challenges.

5. County Championships Review & Talent ID

The Championships were well-received overall, with 11-a-side formats praised on the boys' day and strong performances across the girls' age groups. Improvements proposed for next year include a Plate competition for lower-ranked counties, player walk-outs for finals, and post-game interviews for social media. Talent identification at the event should be better resourced, with staff ensuring they remain for finals where the highest-quality players are on show.

Collection of Payments

Difficulties have been faced surrounding collection of payments throughout the programme. The cost of the Pathway still remains as a very good offering for the expenditure required and no changes in cost are anticipated for the coming season.

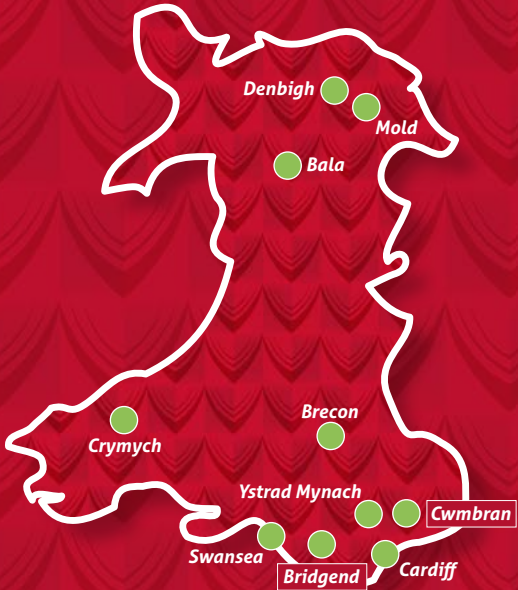

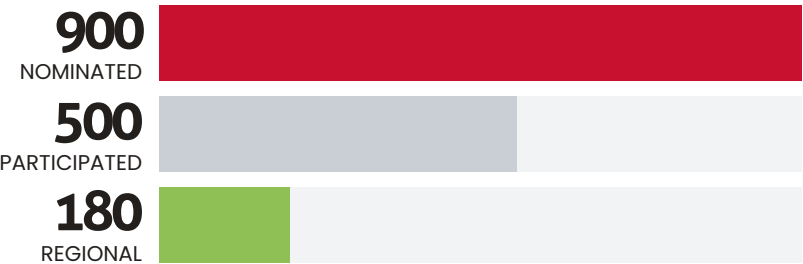

Celebrating 2025/26: Performance Round Up

2025/26 has been another exceptional year for our performance squads, packed with international milestones, historic results, and a clear demonstration of progress across both our senior and junior programmes. The year has seen Welsh hockey teams continuing to rise through the ranks on the European and world stage, setting even higher standards for the seasons ahead.

Senior Men

The Wales Men's Squad delivered one of their most impressive years to date. After a strong showing at the Nations Cup in Malaysia, where they finished 5th and produced high-quality performances against several higher ranked nations, momentum continued to build heading into the 2025 EuroHockey Championship II.

In Portugal, the squad showcased exceptional consistency and composure, culminating in a dramatic shoot out victory over Ireland to take gold. This triumph not only secured them promotion to the EuroHockey Championship A Division in 2027 but also qualification for the 2026 World Cup Qualifiers.

Early in 2026, the team travelled to Santiago, Chile, for the World Cup Qualifiers, an intense competition featuring some of the world's strongest sides. After being drawn in a challenging pool, the team faced a must win match against Scotland, needing to prevail by three goals to progress. Rising to the challenge, they did exactly that in outstanding fashion.

A thrilling 2-1 win over Poland in the classification match sealed 3rd place overall and, most importantly, qualification for the 2026 World Cup, which will take place in the Netherlands and Belgium in August 2026. This marks another historic milestone: Wales Men have now qualified for their second ever World Cup, an achievement that highlights the team's determination, quality, and growth on the international stage.

"It's been a hugely successful year for the senior men's team. Competing for the first time at the Nations Cup, winning the European B division to secure qualification for next summer's European A Division Championships in London and sealing our place at this summer's world cup with a standout qualifying campaign in Chile. The squad continues to go from strength to strength, with younger players stepping up and making a real impact at senior level. Senior Women

The Wales Women's Team also produced a standout year, continuing to strengthen their international presence with outstanding performances and record-breaking results.

Their campaign began with a brilliant bronze medal at the FIH Nations Cup II in Poland, showcasing their ability to compete with, and defeat, nations ranked well above them. Returning to Poland later in the year for the EuroHockey Championship II, the squad went one better, reaching the final and narrowly missing out on gold after a 2-1 loss to Italy. That silver medal secured promotion to the EuroHockey Championship A Division in 2027, their first return to the top tier in 22 years, and qualification for the 2026 World Cup Qualifiers.

At the start of 2026, the team travelled to Hyderabad, India, for the World Cup. Drawn in a tough pool alongside hosts India, Scotland, and Uruguay, the squad performed fearlessly and consistently, pushing Scotland close and putting together highly competitive displays against India on home soil.

Their performance continued into the crossovers, where they recorded a historic first ever win against Korea, a team ranked six places higher. The women finished the World Cup Qualifiers in an excellent 6th place, proving not only their ability to compete with the world's best but also their growing confidence and maturity on the biggest stage.

"It's been a successful and rewarding year for our team. We picked up medals at two of our three international tournaments, earned promotion to the European Championships, and bettered our ranking at the World Cup Qualifiers. Several players made their first appearances and have added real strength to the squad, and were looking to build on this positive momentum as we head towards the European A Division Championships in London next year."

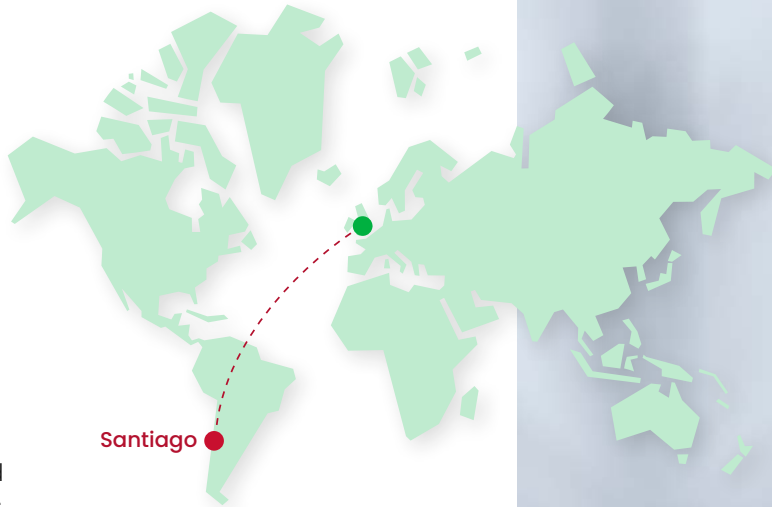
Junior World Cup

The success of our senior teams has been mirrored by exciting developments within our junior performance pathway, with the next generation of Welsh players gaining invaluable international exposure and experience.

In December 2025 our Under 21 Womens team travelled to Santiago, Chile, to compete in the Junior World where they faced an exceptionally tough pool featuring Belgium and Argentina, both ranked among the world’s elite youth sides.

Despite the challenge, the team competed brilliantly, pushing Belgium all the way and showing tactical growth and resilience throughout the tournament. In the crossover stages, they claimed an outstanding victory over South Africa, another higher ranked opponent, and went on to finish 14th overall, a strong finish that surpassed expectations and reflected the rapid progress of the squad.

The Junior World Cup journey was a true testament to the strength and depth within our women’s programme, with performances that not only demonstrated individual potential but also collective belief, unity, and ambition. This experience will play a vital role in shaping the next generation of Welsh internationals.

National Age Groups (NAG's)

2025 Overview

The 2025 season concluded with our U18 Boys and Girls Programme competing at the European Championship II competitions. Our U18 Boys faced some tough competition and conditions in Turkey finishing 8th, whilst our Girls stayed a little closer to home and competed in Scotland, finishing 5th.

- **NAG Girls – Glasgow, Scotland, 13–19 July** (AUT, CZE, IRL, LTU, SCO, TUR, WAL, SUI)
- **NAG Boys – Alanya, Turkey, 13–19 July** (AUT, IRL, ITA, POL, SUI, TUR, UKR, WAL)

Both were valuable learning experiences for our players, staff and programmes. Following completion of the cycle we said goodbye to some of our staff and would like to express our thanks for their contributions to our programmes.

2025/26 NAG U18 Programme

Following a review of our pathway and in recognition of the challenges around available resources, we made the decision to realign our age group programmes into two distinct areas. This shift allows us to focus more on stage of development rather than purely on age. In September 2025, we introduced our Aspiring and Emerging programmes, alongside the appointment of new staff to support their delivery.

Following a competitive selection process (September–January), two full squads were selected for the 2026 Aspiring Programme cycle. Using the same assessment process, we also identified our 2026 Emerging programme cohort, a deliberately smaller group of approximately 14 players, made up of those eligible for the U18 European Championships in 2027 and the U21 European Championships in 2028.

Throughout the programme cycle, we will continue to invite high-performing Regional players into the environment. This approach allows us to expose and develop a broader pool of athletes, particularly in a non-European competition year for U18s. This group will also work towards competing at the School Games in September. All programmes commenced with a residential camp in February, focusing on team building, individual development, and setting clear expectations for the year ahead.

Over Easter (2026), both the Aspiring Girls and Aspiring Boys competed in the Euro 6 Nations tournaments. The Girls travelled to Tonbridge to face Holland, England, USA, and Scotland, while the Boys competed in Frankfurt against Belgium, Poland, Scotland, and Holland. Alongside this, the Emerging Boys held a development camp in Cardiff,

while the Emerging Girls hosted Canada U18s for a three-match series. This proved to be a highly competitive and valuable first experience of junior international hockey for many of the players.

Looking ahead to May, our Aspiring Girls have a comprehensive training programme, while the Emerging Boys will face England Colleges. The Aspiring Boys will also have a series of fixtures against England Over 35s and England U18s, providing further high-quality competition opportunities.

Regional Programme

In 2025, our three Regional Centres (North, South West, South East) supported the technical, physical and holistic development of 180 junior athletes.

The programme aligns with NAG standards, delivering 4-hour, full-day sessions combining on- and off-pitch development. Our regional partnerships with Wrexham University, Swansea University, and Sport Wales play a key role in delivering this programme.

Excitingly in 2026 we introduced an additional Regional Tier; Regional Development Programme. The Regional Development Programme is composed of the selected County players, following completion of the County Championships in February.

Throughout the programme the Regional Performance Programme players can be invited into Emerging Programme Camps. The Programme will culminate with players either joining the Emerging Programme to compete at the School Games in September or they will participate in our inaugural Regional Competition in Cardiff in August. A sincere thank you to all players, parents, and coaches for their continued commitment to the pathway.

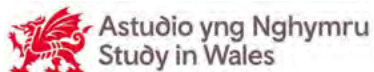
